Remarks by Bert Posthill

I think it was Leonardo da Vinci who was asked to decide which of several machines was the most efficient. His response was very illuminating—he chose the one that made the least noise! There you have it—John Fuller fits that bill to a tee. He is very effective and efficient and he does it without any fuss and bother. It's very deceptive—people don't realize how much he's doing since he accomplishes things without making any noise. John was on the board of directors of the Aerospace Club where he was vice president and program chair, responsible for setting up programs and getting speakers. Now, John is on the board of directors of the Historical Society and is its treasurer.

As if this is not enough, John has just been elected to the Golden Rain Foundation Board of Directors and with a stunning plurality. In addition, while all these things were going on John Fuller has found the time to log over 1,000 hours as a volunteer at Saddleback Hospital.
