LEISURE WORLD CLUBS

Foreign Policy Association

The Foreign Policy Association of New York encouraged establishment of a chapter in Leisure World in 1970. Paul Bremick was elected President of this first group. In 1971, the initial year's operation, there was a re-organization meeting. A number of members, lead by Michael and Helen Seidman, John Bacon and Dr. Wickliffe Stack, proposed that greater participation, franker discussion and more interest could be developed. As a result, small groups were formed with elected discussion leaders.

Meetings were held in (nemebers') homes at first and later some of the groups met in the various clubhouses as rooms became available. All groups use the Foreign Policy Association's yearly booklet, "Great Decisions", as the basis for their discussions. This has proved to be a popular and effective techique.

As of February 1984, there were 207 members and nine discussion groups.

Presidents of the association from 1970 through 1983 were: Paul Bremick, Dr. Lawrence Hill, Dr. Harold Coffman, Edwin Duerbeck, Gen. James Loome, Edward Bolster, Morris Schrager and Ruth Cooper.

Visually Impaired Club

Soon after the opening of Leisure World, the need for an organization for residents with impaired vision became apparent to the first administrator of the medical center. Maj. Gen. Vargelund, the center administrator, contacted Warren Morgan and a subsequent survey revealed that there were about 50 people living in Leisure World who had vision problems.

In April of 1971, under the-name of "Services for the Blind," the first group of about 10 persons met. Early meetings were held in the Community Room of the Great Western Savings & Loan building. Mr. Morgan brought in Dr. Wilhelm de Nuys, the director of Services for the Blind of Santa Ana. He attended meetings and brought in instructors to acquaint the members with the various techniques which have been developed to aid people with impaired vision.

Subsequently, the club meetings were moved to Clubhouse 1 and they are now held on Thursday mornings in the Art Gallery of that building.

In 1975, the organization changed its name from "Services for the Blind" to "Vista Nueva" (Spanish for 'new outlook') and in 1979 the club became "Visually Impaired Club."

The club has received the help of many volunteers who have played an important part in its success. The members who have various degrees of vision loss are encouraged to take active roles in running the club. Totally blind persons have held offices and many who suffered from quite severe visual handicaps have also served as officers and given other essential help.

LW STREET NAMES REFLECT SPANISH HERITAGE

Several years ago, the Leisure World News published an article about the community's street names and following is an excerpt of that information:

When Leisure World was first conceived, it was decided that street names would be Spanish to retain the original cultural influence of Southern Orange County.

Then the residents came. Many were from the southern, northern and eastern portions of the country where Spanish was rarely spoken.

When they arrived in Leisure World they were baffled. "What is a Calle Aragon?" "How do you pronounce Avenida Sosiega and Avenida Despacio?"

Lesiure World resident Marjorie Jones was aware of the confusion concerning street names. Out of curiosity and with the help of two Spanish-English dictionaries and a Spanish-English travel book, she researched the English translation of many of the community streets. Myra Bedel Cochran of Leisure World wrote a guide to pronunciation and understanding of the Spanish-name streets and a combination of Ms. Jones and Mrs. Cochran's research was used to explain the English translation of all streets in Leisure World. Thelma Titus of Leisure World and Jeanne Egasse of Saddleback Community College have made recent contributions to the subject.

The accompanying list of street names includes the Spanish name, the English translation and the phonetic pronunciation. Street names are marked with an asterisk to indicate that the phonetic pronunciation was not available. The translations for three of the street names were uncertain, therefore they were omitted.

THE TREES OF LEISURE WORLD

Ms. Kitzinger's authoritative article of "Trees of Leisure World" began in the Fall 1983 issue of Historical Hi-lites and is concluded in this edition.

The Naturalist Club

Many residents, singly or in groups, take a special interest in the trees and make significant contributions to the community through their efforts in behalf of the trees.

This organization, which started as the Laguna Hills Bird Club in 1965, became the Naturalist Club at the end of 1970 and expanded its interest to trees near the end of 1971. At that time, a Mr. Frank Bruins appeared before the Board as a guest and proposed that the club undertake some form of tree-labeling "for the purpose of promoting knowledge of the many wonderful trees, shrubs, and plants on our grounds." It was decided to label trees in the areas most frequented by the public: Aliso Park, Friendship Walk and the greenbelt. The Naturalist Club donated money for the early labels and has continued to give unlimited support to the project in an amount now totalling over \$2,000.

M.J. Bergfald

It appears to be a truism that when the need arises for a person to perform some special service, that person is already waiting in the wings. So it was with M.J. Bergfald, a former English and speech teacher from Illinois who knew only one species of tree in California when he undertook the project: the olivel But M.J. was not daunted by the hundreds of unfamiliar trees with which he was confronted; he plowed into the vast and complex field of dendrology (scientific tree study) and emerged a master, eventually labeling over 135 species or a total of over 1,200 individual trees! Little wonder that M.J. is known as "The Tree Man of Leisure World!"

Other Contributors

Lorraine Winterer: Lorraine, a member the Naturalist Club, brought to Leisure World a lifelong interest in trees and a scholarly orientation. She did reference work on the botanical names of trees and their country or brigin and thus helped to establish the authenticity of the labels.

Charlotte Truesdale: Charlotte combined an interest in trees with skill as a photographer and and the result is a gunie collection of slides on the trees of Leisure World (now in the possession of the Naturalist Club under the guardianship of M.J. Bergfald).

Bill Lang and Harold Kehlet: These long-time supporters of the Naturalist Club desert special mention for their dedication to the trees of Leisure World. They have stood behind, encouraged, supported, and participated in every effort to preserve and enhance our landscape.

Frank Bruins: Saying that he was grateful for the friendships he had made in Leisure World and that he had enjoyed living here, Mr. Bruins made a generous financial contribution for the purpose of developing a collection of spectacular, interesting and colorful trees at some site where they might be enjoyed by all residents. The result is a site in the northeastern area of (Alico) Park identifiable by the following label:

The Grounds Maintenance Committees

In addition to the unofficial efforts of residents in relation to the landscape, the governing boards of the mutuals take official action through their various grounds committees. These committees meet regularly and deal with a wide range of issues, *especially requests from residents for tree removals*. Following are examples of such requests:

- Resident complains that a mocking bird stations itself in a nearby tree and awakens him every morning with its singing.
- Resident requests removal of a large specimen tree because it is damaging his rose bushes. This would denude a particularly beautiful grassy area on a main throughfare of Leisure World.
- Residents request removal of several large eucalyptus trees because they object to the annual shedding of bark on their lawn.
- Resident complains that her carpeting is being spoiled by tree droppings tracked into her manor.

Examples of this nature go on and on and the committees attempt to deal fairly with residents' problems, while keeping in mind the overall importance of trees to the community. In the final analysis, the residents of Leisure World, through their governing bodies, are responsible for the values that make Leisure World what it is. If they truly value the park-like environment of the community, they will think twice for requesting tree removals for frivolous reasons. They will remember that our trees are the common property of all residents and a primary asset of the community. Should residents ever cease to value their trees, our beautiful Leisure World could all too readily revert to those bare rolling hills of some 25 years ago.

ARCHIVES COMMITTEE

The Archives Committee was formed "To collect, preserve and own such records, books, manuscripts, charts, maps, photographs, films and other materials pertaining to the history of Leisure World of Laguna Hills and its surrounding environs in Orange County, California; to engage in research in connection therewith; and to disseminate information to the public so as to foster knowledge and appreciation of the people and events that contributed to such history."

Archives Committee continued

In order to do this, the Archives Committee has acquired and organized files of clippings, scrapbooks, a complete file of the Leisure World News, photographs, tapes and cassettes. We now are obtaining historical information regarding the approximately 200 clubs and organizations in Leisure World. The committee has put together exhibits regarding Leisure World placed in various savings and loan association offices. There was one at the Leisure World Festival last Fall and there is currently one in place in the exhibit case in the Leisure World library.

The committee needs more adequate space to organize and display in usable form the materials already acquired and to make these available for research and public perusals.

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
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
