WWII Veterans History Project John Bradley, Project Representative

The Leisure World Historical Society has become a participating partner in the Veterans History Project as authorized by the United States Congress and implemented by the Library of Congress.

The initial participation of the Historical Society will be in conducting video taped interviews with Leisure World Veteran residents who have enrolled in the WWII Registry Program.

The interviews will adhere to the "Project Information Guidelines." The video tapes will be retained in the Historical Society Archives for reference by family members, and authorized organizations.

Currently, we are in the early stages of organizing video interview sessions with assistance from the Leisure World Video Club and a representative from the Library of Congress assigned to our project. We are very fortunate to have Sheila Lichtenstein as volunteer Archivist coordinating this activity.

WWII veterans not yet enrolled in our Registry may obtain the enrollment form at our office or at the library. If you know of anyone not yet enrolled, please urge him/her to pick up a form--or pick up one and deliver!

Docent Tours Justine Ratner, Tour Coordinator

After a four and a half month hiatus, due to the unavailability of a Leisure World bus for our use, the Historical Society tours were resumed on September 19th. The Golden Rain Foundation chartered a bus for us to use on these tours, which take place on the first three Thursdays of each month.

On October 24th, the Docent Tour Committee had their semi-annual meeting, at which time they took tour assignments for the period December 2002 through May 2003. Our newest Docent, Rich Holland, was introduced to the group. The tour now starts at the Community Center Building and is being revised to include visits to the third floor activities: Fitness Center, Table Tennis, and both Computer Workshops.

Eleanor Cooper led a special tour on October 28. A Japanese group of 15 people from Kanagawa Province, plus their interpreter, were shown a video of Leisure World and toured the Community Center Building. Eleanor told them about our community and answered questions.



The 11 ton, 32 foot diameter globe which was moved "home" on March 5th from its Laguna Hills site on De La Carlotta will be even more visible within a short time. The Gate 12 electrical engineer designed a 4 flood light plan which has been approved by the City. The Maintenance Division will install the lights. An appropriate sign will go on the Mouton Parkway side of the globe. After that, Bob Miller, who has shepherded this project from day lone, will no longer have the weight of the "world" on his shoulders!

The Peace Globe, presented to the Historical Society by the has been "out" for extensive Renaissance at the Regency, refurbishing but will soon be on display at the Historical Society. This Boehm Globe is a replicate of one President Reagan presented to Russian Premier Gorbachev, and was presented to Ross Cortese. For years, it was displayed at the Rossmoor Regency, but fell into disrepair, with both cracked and missing doves. When the Regency changed owners and was no longer a Rossmoor Regency, they felt it only appropriate that the globe should also come "home!" It won't be as visible as our old globe, but it is a beautiful piece. Stop by and see it.


Veteran Interviewers Trained

Thirteen conscientious volunteers met on November 12 to learn the art of interviewing for the Veterans History Project. The trainer, Dr. Kim Miller, doctorate of Folklore and Anthropology at Cal State University, Northridge, was sent to Leisure World by the Library of Congress to train our volunteers. Not only did we learn the intricacies of "interviewing", but we actually role played as interviewers and interviewees. It was a great learning experience as we honed our interviewing skills.

We are planning one more session of role playing in early December, after which the actual interviews will begin. We are in the process of notifying Leisure World WWII veterans whom we have chosen to be interviewed. These are veterans who are registered with us.

June 10, 1976...All surveys and questionnaires regarding Laguna Hills identify that the community's security program is "number one." This program has been in existence since first families moved in on Sept. 10, 1964. On that date we had only Gate 1 manned, one patrol car and the Chief Security Officer was Mac Barber who had previously headed the security force at Leisure World, Seal Beach. Mac retired in 1967.

As the community grew there were more gates and more patrol cars but also there evolved a pattern of services which is virtually unmatched any where else, as best we know. And growing with the community was the security wall, each segment built with each peripheral mutual and ultimately surrounding each segment of the community such as Phase 1, south of El Toro Road and east of Moulton Parkway which encompasses 5,550 manors.

Also in this phase, Gates 2 and 3 were built along with the housing and manned for the hours needed. Gate 4, being an exit, stood open during the days unmanned for some time until it was found that people wandered or came in unobserved, which had to be stopped by placing an officer there and installing a small gatehouse.

Another facet of the security program was its radio communications, installed shortly after first move-ins. Now the whole fleet is radio controlled plus hot line communications with the county sheriff and fire departments. It is the sheriff who provides police protection in the legal and literal sense of the word. Our security force provides valuable surveillance and much persuasion. The command officers, who are not residents, are

police experienced and thus able to do police type work when called upon in an emergency.

Phase II, north of El Toro Road brought in Gates 5 and 6 and also a serious discussion on a possible gate at Clubhouse 4 (which was found to be not possible at this time). This phase also surrounded the golf course which in itself provides a deterrent buffer zone and Clubhouse 2 with our only unnumbered gate.

Gates 7, 8, 9, 10 and 11 followed as Phase II opened up. Gate 12 is an emergency gate off of Santa Vittorio Drive. Also with the growth of the community came growth surrounding us and the need for a total security wall, where heretofore there had always been the "construction front," unwalled but patrolled by Rossmoor's forces. But the senstivity of having a security construction front has grown to the point that Rossmoor is going to install a temporary chain link fence from Gate 9 to the wall in the immediate future. When completed it will be the first time that the entire occupied community is totally surrounded.

It is the nature of security that surveillance be included 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. Hence a sizeable crew of men are either at the gates, patrolling or responding as needed and they answer wherever help is needed in the community. If security cannot provide the service, they know where to turn for help. One of our police experienced officers heads the force at all times and the residents who man the gates and help in the patrols carry with them a sense of responsibility and responsiveness which has no bounds.

Among the many miscellaneous services provided by security are: foot and vehicle patrols, manning the gates, new move-ins, monitoring street and walk lights, maintaining master file on residents/manors; emergency information; issuance of guest passes; traffic control, advise and assist residents, golf cart licensing, liaison with police and fire, etc., etc.

This is made possible by the willingness of all members to include in their monthly charges a nominal payment for this service which in 1976 is \$5.71. Everyone pays and everyone has the benefit of the Security Program.

A not-to-be overlooked factor is the participation of residents themselves in alerting security regaring any unusual incidents. Everyone cooperates and seems to appreciate the service even when a gate officer may appear to be strict and abrupt.
