DRESIDENTIAL MUSINGS John Fuller

As you can see when you read through this newsletter, we are involved in a number of projects. Preservation of our history through the WWII Veterans' registration and interviewing project; rescuing our landmark globe and refurbishing our porcelain globe, working with UCI on medical lectures. We do, however, have a major purpose, clearly stated in our Articles of Incorporation:

To collect, preserve and own such records, books, manuscripts, charts, maps, photographs, films and other materials pertaining to the history of Leisure World and its surrounding environs in Orange County, California; to engage in research in connection herewith and to disseminate information to the public so as to foster knowledge and appreciation of the people and events that contributed to such history.

This is the Archives part of our charter. For this purpose, we have a large climate controlled area with special lighting to assure preservation of our records. We have an excellent Archivist, Marge Williams, and a dedicated volunteer staff, who have classified, coded and filed all of the many documents continually being added to our records.

What are Archives? Marge has a good explanation of the difference between archives and a library that helps to understand these functions. A library's task is to get as many books into readers hands as possible. They need to be read. Archives, on the other hand, should basically remain on the shelves, to be used for reference in preparing historical treatises. Archives, Marge emphasizes, are not to be considered your family attic!

Our archival material is all catalogued and can be accessed by coming in to review the information or by filling out a request for the information you would like to have the archives staff research for you.

The definition of Archives is not easily understood. Some Leisure World clubs, for instance, store their records in our archives. Meeting minutes are valuable documents; old checkbook stubs are not!

The Society has two very interesting books on Leisure World History for sale, which will help both old and new residents to better understand some of our background. One is Fulfilling Retirement Dreams, by Dr. Tracy E. Strevey and Associates. It is the history of the first twenty five years of Leisure World. The second one, Leisure World History, is a bound volume of the first five issues of the Historical Society Journal, Spring of 1980 through Winter of 1982

In closing, I would like to remind you that volunteers operate your Society. We need help in our Archives. There are surely retirees with archive experience in Leisure World. We also need typists to help with data entry. We would welcome your help in this most worthwhile activity. Call our office, 206-0150, for an appointment to see how you can help!

WWII VETERANS REGISTRY

Veteran registration forms are still coming in, with about 700 registered to date. When the committee first started working on this project, they estimated that 3000 veterans lived in Leisure World. If you are one of the 2300 not yet registered, please pick up a form at our office or in the library! We believe we have the largest concentration of WWII veterans in the country. Compiling information on a sizable portion of our population is a very legitimate project for the Historical Society.

The Veterans History Project, discussed in the next column, is related to but separate from the registry. Information in the Registry is "Confidential" and is entered in a dedicated computer. Selected veterans are asked to participate in the History Project, which is affiliated with the Library of Congress project.



Cataloging and archiving memorabilia as well as all the tapes and biographies received to date is underway. Eleanor Whitesel has been our standby as she patiently helps go through this collection.

(The Veterans History Project is separate from the Veteran Registration project. Some of the veterans who register are asked to volunteer for taping. This is strictly at the option of the veteran.)
