

Why a "survey" of Leisure World residents? Easy question. The UCI staff people have submitted the first draft of the document for Committee review and the Committee is in the process of reducing the important questions to a practical limit. Hopefully, the Survey documents will be mailed to a randomly selected sample of manors later this year. The response to the last two surveys has been exceptionally high and hopefully, this year will be even better.

Community organizations have recognized the value and validity of this project. The Historical Society Committee appreciates their support.

#### WW II VETERANS HISTORY PROJECT Sheila Lichtenstein, Coordinator

Open a door to a curious person in need of a challenge, and the results are usually positive. 3 years ago, Evelyn Shopp, then president of the Society, opened the door. I was the curious person. "It's yours," she said, "Go for it!" And I found a new program just approved by the Board of Directors, a strange computer and a new data base. That's how I became involved in the Veterans History Project.

Just as it was getting started, we heard about the Library of Congress Folklore Department looking for "partners" to participate in their Veterans History Project. Another opened door!

The Leisure World Historical Society as a Partner with the Library of Congress, just completed a very successful year. We have over 750 veteran biographies on file. 265 veterans have been contacted and 135 have been interviewed and video taped. I had the privilege of going to Washington D.C. and personally delivering 125 of these biographies to the Library of Congress. I also brought several DVDs (taped interviews) and pictures of the interviewer and veteran which are snapped before each taping.

The staff of the Library gathered and couldn't praise our "show and tell" enough. We are one of their prized "partners!" They kept the DVDs and the photos. Their project is fairly new and poorly funded. Each piece of history we send them is logged in their data bank and greatly cherished.

As I retire as coordinator of this project, I must convey to ALL with whom I have worked-you have made this one of the most successful. Veterans History Projects in the country. I thank all of you for your devotion and your hours and hours of volunteering where and when needed. Due to limited space, I dare not list any "special" volunteers for fear of a gross injustice to all. I hope I will be able to do that in a future issue of the Newsletter.

In all wars, we know the winners and the losers, but the real history has always come from the letters and stories of the men and women who wore the uniforms and served their country. Our project is "real history."

## Medical Lecture Series

Dr. John Longhurst, Professor of Medicine and Cardiologist, was the first speaker in the fall Medical Series Lectures. Dr. Longhurst currently oversees the Susan Samuel Center for Complimentary and Alternative Medicine. In his October 21st lecture, he examined and explained the role of Acupuncture (and other Alternatives) in Clinical Medicine today.

Ira Joss, Chairman for the Series, arranges for these talks by UCI Medical School faculty. Our space and their available time must mesh, and sometimes this is not easy! Ira is to be commended for a job well done.

### LA BREA TAR PITS AND MUSEUM WEDNESDAY, DECEMBER 3

The Society has scheduled what promises to be an "historic" day trip excursion into the prehistoric era when it visits the world famous La Brea Tar Pits and Museum on December 3. The "Pit" is a natural accumulation of tar that formed over the site of an ancient oil seep. Petroleum from rock strata deep beneath the ground oozed upward to form pools on the surface. As the oil lost its volatile elements a thick deposit of asphalt was formed. Animals coming to the seeps for water or attempting to cross the tarry surface became mired in the death trap. This all happened about 2.5 million years ago!

The trip bus will leave Gate 3 at 9 a.m. and will arrive at the "Grove", a component of the recently renovated Farmer's Market at approximately 10 a.m. Lunch, featuring a combination plate of barbecued chicken, skillet baked beans, cole slaw, dessert with soft drink will be served at the Wood Ranch Restaurant, on the premises.

Then it's off by trolley to the nearby museum, to view the legendary dinosaurs who existed on all the continents, as well as the huge Brontosaurus of North America, during the Jurassic period, and other long ago inhabitants.

The bus is scheduled to return to Leisure World between 4:30 and 5 pm.

Wheel chairs are available for museum viewing. They must be reserved in advance. If one is needed, indicate on the reservation.

Cost per person, including lunch and all tips, is \$45. To be part of this memorable adventure, make reservations as indicated below, by November 20.
