Sherry Hamilton Office Manager Now that "Fall" is finally here and accompanied by some much needed precipitation (but don't overdo it!) the Historical Society is involved in its annual membership drive. Your membership allows us to carry on our many projects. So we hope you will stay with us, or join us if you haven't, in this endeavor. News of our projects will be found in this Newsletter.

I'm still intrigued by items I find in reviewing our Leisure World History and would like to quote some more. A visitor to our Society desk the other day wanted to know who owned the land before Ross Cortese purchased it. I found this and other items in Marjorie Jones' history:

1962: The Moulton ranch property seemed to meet Mr. Cortese's need. It was still ranch grazing land. While riding the ranch property in 1962 with Mrs. Nellie Gail Moulton, his search ended as he closed the deal for 2200 acres of the ranch property.

1972: Building of Clubhouse 4 was under way and a storm of protests, resulting in lawsuits by the immediate residents, arose from the lack of a suitable entry to the Clubhouse area.

In response to environmental regulations, it was decided to change all Leisure World vehicles licensed under the name Golden Rain, to the use of compressed natural gas. this complied with all fuel emission requirements.

The final day, long anticipated, arrived when Golden Rain concluded arrangements for the purchase of the golf course. An unusual clause in the contract provided that if Rossmoor didn't complete the building for the entire Leisure World before the loan was paid, the balance would be canceled.

1973: Another of Rossmoor's plans called for an elaborate "spa" in the area near Gate 3. an application to the County for a change in zoning was granted. It was understood that the spa would be operated as a subscription membership club and subscribers were called for. It was another dream that didn't make it.

Money had been appropriated by Golden Rain for its share in installing signal lights and turn lanes for traffic at the exit on El Toro Road from Gate 7. In the future, when Phase 4 is developed, its street will be directly opposite.

1974: On April 28, with all pomp and ceremony, which it merited, the Towers were topped out. Mrs. Albert Wicks of Leisure World presented the official flag which was raised with military salute. Everyone was at attention when the huge crane lifted the carob tree to the roof of Tower 1 in the traditional rite of completion.

I find our history interesting and hope you will also.



#### Leisure World -- 1967 style

In 1967, a group called STARS Inc. (Senior Talent Active Reserve Services) produced a book, People in Action, Laguna Hills and Orange County. The introduction to the book stated "Just to prove that full retirement doesn't bring boredom, a group of residents of Leisure World, Laguna Hills, California, teamed up in an organization known as STARS and is publishing this book in order to give firsthand testimony to the world that they have found not only recreation for mind and body. opportunities for community service through energetic and enthusiastic use of native talents and years of experience. Leisure World is for people 52 years and older. More than 40% work full time."

The book appears to be more than half advertising, with businesses from all over South County represented--Santa Ana, San Clemente, Tustin, Orange, Laguna Beach, Newport Beach and many more.

Some of the advertisers are still in business, but others have long since left us.

#### ARCHIVAL "RETRIEVALS"

(Your editor asked Archivist Marjorie to do a story on the Golden Rain trees for this edition. In true Archivist style, she went to the Archives, pulled out the July 1999 issue of this Newsletter-- same editor--and gave it to me with a bit of a flourish. Hope you enjoy it as much as I did, second time around. The last paragraph is an update as of October this year, and represents the "investigative journalist" soul of the editor.)

I suspect that I am not the only one in Leisure World who has wondered where the term "golden rain" came from -- as in the name "Golden Rain Foundation." For a long time I thought it went back to Mr. Cortese, who must have felt showered with gold when his developments became so popular and sold out. Not true, however.

The real story behind the name can be credited to the poetic side of Mr. Cortese, not his financial situation. According to a story published in one of the first issues of The Golden Rain News, the golden rain tree is small and its flowers are bright vellow. hanging in drooping clusters. The seeds grow in pods that hang on the tree until the new growth appears. It is described as a gorgeous tree when in bloom because the brilliant blossoms hanging in clusters from drooping branches can be likened to "golden rain."

It was in New Orleans that Cortese first saw the golden rain tree and fell in love with its beauty. Here was born the idea of making these unusual trees the symbol of the unusual community he was planning for senior citizens.

ascertaining that these Cortese. could live in Southern trees California, ordered 2,700 to be sent to a nursery in Chino, California. where they were carefully nurtured until ready to be planted in Seal Beach Leisure World. But time has taken its toll on the golden rain trees of Leisure World: Today only three golden rain trees grace the property in Seal Beach.

The Golden Rain Foundation has survived far better than the trees. originally given to The name was the company at the very center of government and management Seal Beach, and carried over to Laguna Hills with the difference that at Laguna it had a less powerful role as custodian and overseer of only responsibilities wide community other than those in the housing areas themselves.

#### 2004 update

According to Ismael Saenz, Landscape Manager, there are between 35 and 40 golden rain trees in this community. The most noticeable group is located near the historic sycamore on Aliso Creek. They were in full bloom before the last rain. There is a lone one near the maintenance building, with others scattered throughout the community.
