LEISURE WORLDER of the MONTH – JEROME LEDERER



Safety was the prime concern of Jerome Lederer throughout his 50 years in aviation. Both with civilian and government organizations in aviation and space probes, he worked for and wrote about safety in flight. His last position before retiring was director of safety for NASA.

In 1965 Lederer was awarded one of the highest honors in aviation, the Wright Brothers Memorial Award, presented for his improvements in all elements of flight safety. Two years later, he was invited to organize the new Office of Manned Space Flight Safety for NASA end eventually headed the entire safety

program there.

Previously for 20 years he had served concurrently as director of the Flight Safety Foundation and of the Cornell Guggenheim Aviation Safety Center. He was also director of the Safety Bureau of the Civil Aeronautics Board which developed into the present National Transportation Safety Board.

This aviation pioneer began his career as an aeronautical engineer in the old United States Air Mail Service after graduating from the College of Engineering at NYU. Later he was chief engineer in charge of loss prevention for Aero Insurance Underwriters from 1929-1947 and his many other positions included first director of the Safety Bureau of the Civil Aeronautics Board from 1940-42. The following two years he was director of training for the Airlines War Training Institute, organized to train airmen for the U.S. Air Transport Command.

Quite understandably, Jerome Lederer is listed in "Who's Who in Engineering," "Who's Who in Aviation," "Architects of the Age of Flight" and "American Men of Science."
