Background: Dollar, a Canadian native, came to the Golden State as a youth and developed a lifelong passion for science, particularly as it related to food and nutrition.

He picked up his bachelor and master's degrees at the UC Berkeley campus and garnered a doctorate in small animal nutrition from the University of Reading in England.

During World War II he served as a Navy officer in the Pacific Theatre then worked as a microchemist, researcher, assistant professor and eventually a professor at the University of Hawaii. He also worked as a consultant for the United Nations.

He retired to Leisure World in 1986 and got into the PC Users Group in its infancy, Security work (as a gate officer and trainer), the Camera Club, Lawn Bowling and taking Emeritus classes in crochet, sewing and pattern making.

When asked why he got into the latter, Dollar says he enjoys the challenge, creativity

and control of making clothing for his wife and himself.

His pride and joy is a polar fleece robe which he made from scratch. It wasn't any cheaper than a store bought and took a considerable amount of time to cut, assemble and complete but the result is something he is proud of.

"I hate to see people here not doing anything, if they don't keep their minds active they do strange things."
